MANDATE

The Oshawa Historical Society was founded in 1957 and is an affiliate of the Ontario Historical Society. The purpose of the Oshawa Historical Society is to bring together those individuals interested in the diverse historical aspects of Oshawa and to research, record, retain, preserve and present historical information pertaining to the Oshawa area. The objectives of the Society are:

- Encourage the study and research of the history of Oshawa.
- Secure and preserve an accurate account of the historical, architectural and archaeological heritage of Oshawa.
- Promote public interest in the history of Oshawa.
- Maintain, as an agent of the City of Oshawa, a community museum and archives as a repository for artefacts and written records of historical interest to Oshawa.

GOVERNANCE

The Oshawa Historical Society's governing body is the Board of Directors whose members are elected by the membership at the Annual General Meeting held in May.

Standing and ad-hoc committees assist the Board in their duties. These committees report to the Board and bring important matters to the Board for discussion and direction. The Standing Committees are: Finance and Audit Committee, Governance Committee and Human Resources Committee.

The day-to-day operations of the Oshawa Museum and the Oshawa Historical Society are the responsibility of the professional staff under the direction of the Executive Director.

President's Report



To say this has been a challenging year would be an understatement, and each of us has faced different struggles as we navigated through these many months of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Oshawa Museum has been among many cultural and community organizations that has been largely closed to the public for 12 months. Our staff has done an admirable job of creating new avenues in programming in an effort to adapt to these unique times. It has not been easy, but under the steady leadership of the staff team, the museum and the Oshawa Historical Society has persevered. It seems likely that some of our new programming options will continue even after the worst of this pandemic is over and operations return to a more 'normal' state. The benefits of some virtual programming are clear – greater options for speakers, wider range of audience, no weather related cancellations, etc. Given our ongoing space

restrictions at the museum, this required pivot to more online experiences is something we can certainly use going forward. Alongside that knowledge, our commitment to pursuing new capital improvements for the museum remains. At some point, we will all be able to gather again – and the Oshawa Museum can be a cultural hub in the southern part of our City. As things move forward over the next year, the Board will continue to advocate for new space so that the museum can further develop as the home to Oshawa's history.

This past week I have been reflecting on all the changes that our museum houses have silently witnessed over the many years they have existed. My own connection to the museum buildings dates back to my childhood growing up in a nearby neighbourhood, through experiences as a co-op student in high school, to many walks along the lakeshore with my late father when we would often discuss the houses and his own memories of them. It is comforting to know that our buildings are making it through these latest events and will be waiting for us when we can return to tours, garden teas, and on-site education programs. I look forward to seeing many of you in the doorways of Henry House, Robinson House, and Guy House again soon!

On behalf of the Board, I would like to express sincere gratitude to the staff, our volunteers, the City of Oshawa and our community partners for their continued support. Be well, and stay safe.

Through the Young Canada Works and Canada Summer Jobs programs, we brought two students onto the OM team: one for the summer, and one started in the summer and continued through to December, because of a Grant extension.
